### Scientists use AI to create drug regimes for rare forms of brain cancer in children

Scientists have successfully used artificial intelligence to create a new drug regime for children with a deadly form of brain cancer that has not seen survival rates improve for more than half a century revealed in the journal Cancer Discovery, is set to usher in an “exciting” new era, experts say AI can be harnessed to invent and develop new treatments for all types of cancer.

## Inside the Facebook Files

For the **Alan Turing Institute**, researcher **Babatunde Okunoye** shares insight on why digital identity projects have faced slow user acceptance and adoption in parts of Africa. "Technologies implemented as developmental objectives reflect the politics or values of governments in power."

## Fighting Silicon Valley's Surveillance Machine

In an article for the **Washington Post** about tech-related biases against people of colour, **Joan Donovan** gives her perspective on digital redlining. "The concept of redlining is old ... But it's often that you have to demonstrate that the digital (realm) doesn't erase these distinctions, but rather tends to focus them and exacerbate them."

## Human Oversight of Government Algorithms: Policy Flaws

In a new paper, **Ben Green** argues that human oversight policies allow the government to use flawed or controversial algorithms without addressing the fundamental issues with the tools — and proposes a new approach for determining how algorithms should be used.

## OnlyFans, Sex Work, and Section 230

**Lumen** summer research assistant **Anna Callahan** writes that OnlyFans' recent controversy over hosting online sex work brings the debate around **Section 230** into sharp focus. "Legal scholars from both sides of the ideological spectrum have reached the consensus that the amendment, while well-intentioned, failed to meaningfully prevent sex trafficking or protect sex workers."

## How Police Officers Weaponise Copyright

**Lumen** researcher **Shreya Tewari** writes that instances of police officers playing **copyrighted music** to prevent recordings of them from spreading online show that Fair Use must be automated. Today's copyright algorithms, Tewari explains, "are almost by definition ill-equipped to take note of context."

## Is the Internet affordable?

**Sonia Jorge** and the **Alliance for Affordable Internet** assess the obstacles facing internet equity for their annual report. "The Covid-19 pandemic has laid bare the scale and consequences of the digital divide and underlined the urgent need to find solutions to digital inequality."

## The Challenges with Researching Facebook

For **Lawfare**, **Evelyn douek** talks with **Quinta Jurecic** and **Alex Abdo** about Facebook's recent moves to discourage independent researchers from collecting data on its website. "The terms of service has a result of inhibiting the work that is urgently needed," Abdo said.

## **Robo-penguin: how artificial birds are relaying the secrets of ocean currents**

The latest advance in marine sensory equipment is a penguin-like device called a Quadroin, an autonomous underwater vehicle (AUV): a 3D-printed self-propelled machine designed to mimic a penguin to measure the properties of oceanic eddies. Eddies are small ocean currents that other research methods have struggled to capture. They influence all the animals and plants in the seas and the Earth's climate, driving roughly 50% of all phytoplankton production.

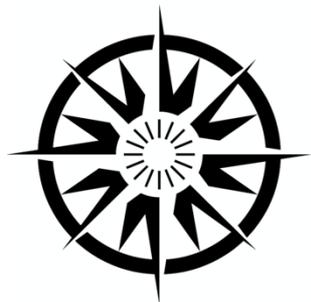
Why do voice assistants have female voices? Well, it has been theorised that both men and women feel more comfortable listening to a female's voice, whereas a male's voice feels more divisive.
